I'm delighted to be collaborating with the Niagara Symphony Orchestra and our four stunning soloists: Mireille Asselin, Ariana Maubach, River Guard, and Jesse Blumberg. A special thank you to collaborative pianist Vlad Soloviev and conductor Yuan Chen for their expert support in rehearsals!

If you enjoy tonight's program, mark your calendars! Our season continues with the timeless beauty of Handel's Messiah on December 20th, the evocative storytelling of Reena Esmail's Malhaar: A Requiem for Water on February 28th, and Vaughan Williams's radiant Five Mystical Songs on April 25th, alongside the world premiere of a major new work by Cree composer Andrew Balfour.

Whether this is your first concert or you've been part of the Chorus Niagara family for decades, thank you for joining us. Your presence turns every performance into a shared moment of human connection, and I can't wait to share that with you!

# **PROGRAMME NOTES**

In the spirit of new beginnings that honour the past, we start tonight's concert with a world premiere: a new arrangement of Leslee Hevs's "All Shall Be Well" that invokes Julian of Norwich's (c.1342-c.1416) timeless words: "All shall be well, and all shall be well, and all manner of things shall be well." Originally composed for upper voices and piano, we commissioned Leslee to create a new arrangement for mixed choir and string orchestra especially for this evening's performance. It's a luminous and hopeful beginning, foreshadowing our theme of resilience, Brahms's own journey from darkness to light, and the "pacem" (peace) ultimately sought in Mozart's final masterpiece.

The initial inspiration for tonight's program began with Johannes Brahms's Schicksalslied, or Song of Destiny, a rarely performed piece that I have been hoping to program since I first came across it many years ago. Brahms was fascinated by the poem "Hyperions Schicksalslied" by Friedrich Hölderlin, and obsessed over how he might set it to music, daunted by the recent success of his German Requiem. Referred to by some as the "Little Requiem," the Song of Destiny depicts a serene, divine realm in the opening two verses in the luminous key of E-flat major. The tone suddenly changes with the arrival of the third verse, portraying humanity's struggles and tireless longing for rest in the stormy relative key of C minor. While Brahms's earlier drafts returned to the opening music in E-flat major to bring some resolution to the strangely dark ending of the poem, Brahms was dissatisfied and felt it disregarded the turmoil depicted in the third verse. He ultimately arrived at a musical solution that changed the very meaning of the text, transporting the listener back to a more peaceful realm, but only by transforming the C minor gloom into a newly hopeful and stubbornly optimistic reprise in C major. It is as though he is saying: We may not reach the lofty utopia of the opening section, but through humanity's tireless perseverance through seemingly insurmountable obstacles, we maybe will reach a humble version of peace.

After intermission, we turn to the monumental and mysterious world of Mozart's *Requiem*, this time presented in the Robert Levin completion. The *Requiem* was famously unfinished, left incomplete at Mozart's death and traditionally performed in the completion by his student, Franz Xaver Süssmayr. While Süssmayr's version is the most well-known, Robert Levin's completion brings a fresh perspective, informed by modern scholarship and a deep understanding of Mozart's style. The Levin completion is notable for its attention to Mozart's musical language, filling in gaps with a sense of historical and stylistic authenticity (and a new "Amen" fugue!). Where Süssmayr's completion sometimes smooths over rough edges, Levin embraces some of the more daring harmonic and contrapuntal ideas that Mozart hinted at. The result is a version of the Requiem that feels both familiar and newly revelatory, allowing us to hear this iconic work with fresh ears. We invite you to experience tonight's performance of Mozart's *Requiem* not just as a monumental work of historical music, but as a living, breathing piece of art that continues to evolve.

Only after beginning rehearsals this September did I notice the prominence of a single word in each of the three texts sung on tonight's program: "Rest." — "Ruhen" — "Requiem." We all know that an artist's role is to hold up a mirror to the desires of humanity in their time and place, and apparently, for two and a half centuries (or eight if you include the 14th century mystic poetess of our opening piece), we have all been seeking the same thing.

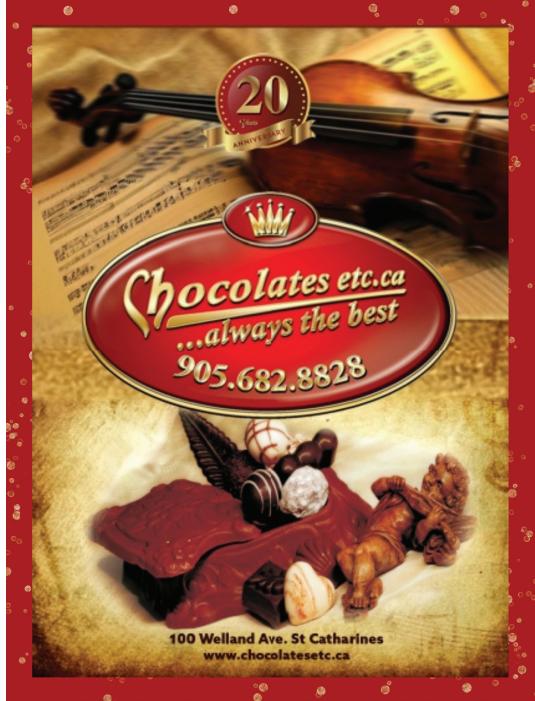

# KATHLEEN ALLAN, ARTISTIC DIRECTOR

Kathleen Allan is the Artistic Director of Chorus Niagara, Artistic Director of the Amadeus Choir of Greater Toronto, and a member of the music faculty at the University of Toronto. In high demand as a guest conductor, commissioned composer, and clinician, she is equally comfortable working in early, contemporary, and symphonic repertoire.

Since the beginning of her tenure with the Amadeus Choir in 2019, the Choir has commissioned over a dozen new works, founded the Choral Creation Lab for emerging composers and poets, and formed new partnerships with diverse artists and ensembles throughout the GTA and beyond. From 2016-2023, she served as the Artistic Director of Canzona, Winnipeg's professional Baroque choir, with whom she conducted many of the masterworks of the Baroque era. A devoted interpreter of early music and steeped in the practice of historically-informed performance, she is passionate about finding relevant contemporary context for the works of the past and sharing their universal power with broad audiences. Recent guest conducting engagements include the Luminato Festival, Vancouver Symphony Orchestra, Victoria Symphony, Regina Symphony Orchestra, Newfoundland Symphony Orchestra, Manitoba Chamber Orchestra, and Early Music Vancouver. In 2015, Ms. Allan made her Asian debut conducting Handel's *Messiah* and Bach's *Christmas Oratorio* in Japan, and in 2016, she was the recipient of the Sir Ernest MacMillan Prize in Choral Conducting.

Her compositions have been commissioned, performed and recorded by ensembles throughout the Americas and Europe and have been featured at two World Symposiums on Choral Music. Her music is published by Boosey and Hawkes, Oxford University Press, and Cypress Choral Music, and she is a MusicSpoke composer. Inspired by her Celtic roots and musical upbringing in Newfoundland and Labrador, her compositions often fuse contemporary rhythms and harmonies with undertones of ancient folk music. Also an accomplished soprano, she has appeared as a soloist with the National Broadcast Orchestra, Berkshire Choral Festival, and the Vancouver Symphony Orchestra. In addition to freelancing regularly in Canada and the US, she has performed as a member of the Vancouver Chamber Choir, the Arnold Schoenberg Chor (Vienna), Skylark Vocal Ensemble (Atlanta), Clarion Choir (New York), and the Yale Schola Cantorum (New Haven).

As a passionate educator, she served as Visiting Professor of Conducting at Western University from 2019 to 2021, and now teaches conducting to undergraduate and graduate students and directs the Chamber Choir at the University of Toronto. She holds a degree in composition from the University of British Columbia and a master's degree in conducting from Yale University.



# VLAD SOLOVIEV, COLLABORATIVE PIANIST

Vlad Soloviev is a Hamilton-based pianist, conductor and operatic vocal coach. As an operatic repetiteur, Vlad has worked at the Canadian Opera Company, Wolftrap Opera, Opera Theatre of Saint Louis, Opera Arizona, Opera Sarasota, Highlands Opera Studio and University of Toronto Opera School and more. As a conductor, Vlad has worked at Wolftrap Opera, Opera Arizona, Berlin Opera Academy, Mississauga Symphony Orchestra and Mississauga Festival Choir. As a concert pianist, Vlad has played at institutions like Carnegie Hall (New York), Salle Cortot (Paris), Bohemian National Hall (New York)

performed at institutions like Koerner Hall (Toronto), National Arts Center (Ottawa), Richard Bradshaw Amphitheater, the Kaufman Center (NYC), Toronto Summer Music Festival and more. Vlad has worked at institutions like the Eastman School of Music. Mannes College of Music, University of Toronto and the Glenn Gould School, performing over 200 recitals over the past ten years. As a vocal coach, Vlad helped singers prepare for successful auditions at institutions like the Paris Opera, Deutsche Oper, Metropolitan Opera, Merola, Santa Fe, Canadian Opera Company, Vancouver Opera, Opera de Montreal, and more.

# **GUEST ARTISTS**



# MIREILLE ASSELIN

Deemed "a treasure" by the Toronto Star, Canadian soprano Mireille Asselin enjoys a diverse career spanning opera, concert, and recital repertoire. A five-season artist at the Metropolitan Opera, she gained acclaim stepping in as Adele on opening night of *Die Fledermaus*, one of New York's "most enchanting" performances of the season.

Recent roles include La Folie (*Platée*, Garsington Opera), Jonathas (*David et Jonathas*, Opera Atelier), Barbarina (*Le nozze di Figaro*, Canadian Opera Company), and Zerlina (*Don Giovanni*, Edmonton Opera/NAC). This season brings her debuts with London's Royal Ballet and Opera in Handel's *Giustino*, and the Canadian premiere

of 10 Days in a Madhouse with Tapestry Opera.

An accomplished concert artist, she has appeared with major ensembles including the Orchestre de Chambre de Paris, Minnesota Orchestra, and Les Violons du Roy. Ottawa-born, Asselin holds degrees from Yale University and Toronto's Glenn Gould School.



# ARIANA MAUBACH

Canadian mezzo-soprano Ariana Maubach has been praised for her "plush, dark timbre voice of exceptional richness" (Parterre Box). She was recently named a winner of the Canadian Opera Company Ensemble Studio Competition, earning both First Prize and Audience Choice, and was a 2025 national semifinalist in the Metropolitan Opera Laffont Competition. This season, Ariana joins the Canadian Opera Company Ensemble Studio, performing Rosina (ensemble performance) and Berta in *Il barbiere di Siviglia*, while covering Stephano in *Roméo et Juliette*, Countess Ceprano and The Page in *Riaoletto*, and Katchen in *Werther*.

Recent highlights include Ragonde in *Le Comte Ory* at the Merola Opera Program and Hazel in the world premiere of Derrick Wang's *Fearless* with Opera Delaware. An alum of the Academy of Vocal Arts, University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music, and Eastman School of Music, she has also appeared as Dorabella in *Così fan tutte* and Smeton in *Anna Bolena*.



# RIVER GUARD

Canadian Tenor River Guard was recently awarded Michigan District Winner in the Metropolitan Opera's Laffont Competition, as well as being named 3rd prize winner of the Canadian Opera Company's Ensemble Studio Competition. River was a Resident Artist at Detroit Opera from 2023 to 2025, where he served as B.F. Pinkerton cover in Puccini's Madama Butterfly, Ferrando cover in Mozart's Così fan tutte, and Alfredo cover as well as performed Gastone in Verdi's La Traviata. In the 2023 Season, River made his Opera Theatre of St. Louis debut as Elder Gleaton, covering Sam Polk in a new production of Susannah by Patricia Racette. River also covered the role of Mario Cavaradossi in James Robinson's premiere production of Tosca.

Notable roles include Lensky (*Eugene Onegin*), Don Ottavio (*Don Giovanni*), Rinuccio (*Gianni Schicchi*), Don José (*La tragédie de Carmen*), Eisenstein (*Die Fledermaus*), Male Chorus (*The Rape of Lucretia*) and Miles Zegner (*Proving Up*). 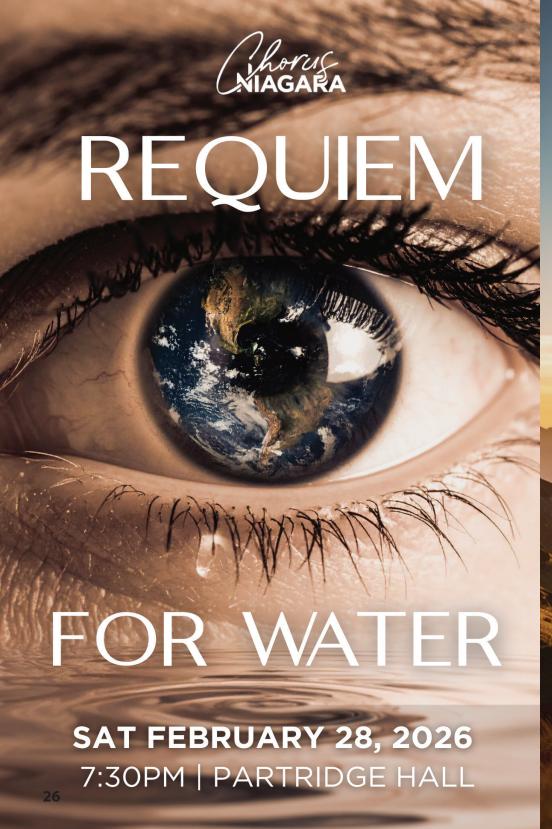

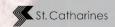
